Aiming High for Disabled Children

'Aiming High for Disabled Children' is a major government investment in services for families of children with disabilities and learning difficulties including autism spectrum disorders, ADHD and other disabilities.

Every Local Authority has been allocated substantial grants up to 2011. In Northumberland we have been given £60k 'preparation grant' this year (2008-2009). We have been told we will receive £360k in 2009-2010 and £1.1m in 2010-2011. The money must be spent to provide new **short break** services for families of children with disabilities and learning difficulties. It must not be used to pay for existing short break or other services.

'**Short breaks**' means parents being able to have regular, planned breaks from the responsibility of caring for their disabled child. This may be for a few hours, during the day, evening, overnight or for a whole weekend. The breaks might happen at home or in a residential or community setting.

Examples of **short break** services are:

- ◆ Sitting
- ◆ Enablers to take children out
- ◆ Training up child minders and nurseries to accept disabled children more easily
- ◆ Training up sports and youth groups, after school and holiday schemes to accept disabled children more easily
- ◆ More weekend and holiday playschemes specially for disabled children
- ◆ Recruiting foster carers to look after certain disabled children overnight or for weekends
- ◆ More places residential places like Monksfield and Barndale

As part of the **Aiming High for Disabled Children** programme, Local Authorities are also expected to:

- ♦ improve information available to families of children with disabilities and learning difficulties;
- ♦ ensure the views of parents of children with disabilities and the children and young people themselves are listened and responded to;
- ♦ address issues of eligibility and assessment for services;
- ♦ develop and train the local workforce so there are enough trained people to work in short break services.

We are working hard to get other places signed up to the scheme and will update you before the school Summer holidays with any news.



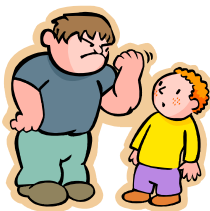

Tell us about bullying !

Contact a Family is joining forces with Parentline Plus to produce a guide for parents of disabled children to help them cope if their child is being bullied and we're looking for your help.



Research suggests that more than one in three disabled children have been bullied at school and many parents can feel they have nowhere to turn. Bullying can take place at school, on school transport, in playgrounds, at leisure activities, online; bullying can take place anywhere.

The guide will be a tool for parents to help them cope if their child is being bullied. As well as containing information about the law relating to bullying and the action schools should be taking, it will include parents' experiences.

If your child has been bullied or is being bullied because of their disability and you'd like to share your experiences to help other parents please get in touch. Contact a Family would also like to hear from you if your child has been bullied because they have a disabled sibling.

They want to know how you spotted signs of bullying, the strategies you used to deal with the bullying, how you coped with the situation and any advice you would like to give to other parents in similar situations. Your experiences will be used anonymously in the guide.

The guide is due to be published in November in time for Anti-Bullying Week 2008.

Free Cinema Ticket for Carers!

The Cinema Exhibitors' Association Card is a nationally recognised card entitling the holder to a free cinema ticket *for the person accompanying them*. To apply for the card, you will need to meet one or more of the following criteria:

- a) Be in receipt of the disability living allowance or attendance allowance.
- b) Be a registered blind person.



The card is valid for 3 years from the date of issue and costs £5.00 to pay for processing. An application form can be printed from the CEA website or collected from a participating cinema. Details of the nearest participating cinemas can also be accessed via the CEA website: www.ceacard.co.uk

The card is issued to the person requiring the assistance and there are no restrictions for the carer.
